Letter from Catherine Tatge the CCS Board of Education President and Patricia Corvello

Made a motion to approve the minutes as presented.

a) the CCS Interim Principal regarding the proposed merger of 7th & 8th grade sports programs for all six Region 1 towns.

Copy of email document from Michael Shelby, owner of Shall Be LLC. Shall Be LLC is the IT contractor employed by the CCS Board of Education to provide IT support and

equipment. The email addressed internet security and the processes in place currently as well as future steps to be taken to ensure all computers and IT activity is protected.

Janet Carlson suggested CEN as a resource and it was noted that staff of Shall Be LLC is registered for the 11/19/19 conference on Ransomware that CEN is hosting.

Board of Selectmen

First Selectman Ridgway reported in brief on the following items.

- a) Retirement of Joyce Hart the long time secretary for the Selectmen's office. A job posting is being formulated and it is the expectation of the BoS that a replacement will be in place by the retirement date of January 20th 2020.
- b) Open position at the DPW: a Help Wanted ad will been posted and it is the expectation of the BoS that the position will be filled by the end of the calendar year.
- c) Bridge Projects: the projects on Lake Road and Cream Hill, are substantially complete. There is a small amount of residual funding from the Bridge financing to address other smaller projects.
- c) WC Wastewater: a funding application to USDA is expected to be submitted by the end of the calendar year.
 - 1) Taxpavers will need to approve a project sometime in the Spring of 2020
 - Cornwall has been approached by a management company that is interested in our project and introduced the possibility of working for Cornwall.
- d) Cyber Security: First Selectman Ridgway has had a conversation with the Town IT consultant and reports that because the town does not operate on a Network and each computer is a stand alone entity that reduces our risk significantly. Additionally the town uses Carbonite as a backup system so even in the event of a individual departmental system hack, all information could be retrieved from Carbonite.

Dear Parents and School Community,

The Region 1 administration has proposed merging the 7th and 8th grade sports programs from all six Region 1 towns in order to counteract declining enrollment across the region as well as to encourage regional cohesion and promote a higher level of competitiveness and opportunity for our students. This merger would tentatively take effect for the 2020-2021 school year. Each sport would be hosted by a school in the region.

Students would be provided bus transportation from CCS to the host school for practice and then after practice would be transported to Housatonic Valley Regional High School (HVRHS) in order to catch the 5:45 pm late bus back to CCS. Games would work in a similar fashion, students would be picked up from CCS and brought to the game site but after the game students would only be transported back to HVRHS, not back to CCS. On game days, parents would be responsible for either picking their child up from the game site or from HVRHS after the bus returns. Estimated return time to the high school on game days would be 6:30 pm for Fall and Spring sports and 7:30 pm for Winter sports.

There is also possible future expansion of the offerings to include more sports and activities like robotics or engineering club. Anne MacNeil, the Athletic Director for Region 1 who oversaw the formation of this plan, would like to stress that certain details of this plan might still change, such as the home sites for some of the sports, proposed opponents etc.

The Middle School Athletics and Activities Committee, which includes representation from all the Region 1 towns (John Sanders from Cornwall), has crafted a preliminary proposal which includes an estimated budget and proposed home sites for 7 sports with transportation schedules. That proposal will be presented to Cornwall parents and community members by Anne MacNeil at the next Cornwall Board of Education Meeting on November 20th (Wednesday) at 5:30 p.m. in the CCS community room.

The Cornwall Consolidated School Board of Education is being asked by the Region 1 Administration to decide at our November 20th board meeting on whether or not CCS would like to join this arrangement. We would very much like to hear from parents and community members before we vote. The meeting on November 20th is an opportunity for all members of the CCS community to hear about this plan, ask questions, and express any opinions they have about what is presented.

All of the other elementary school Boards of Education in Region 1 will be voting on this proposal at their November meetings also. There are 6 elementary school Boards of Education in Region 1. If any 4 of those Boards vote to accept this proposal, it passes and becomes a new shared service as part of the Regional Schools Services Center (RSSC).

It is important that as many community members as possible attend the November 20th meeting so that the Cornwall Consolidated School Board of Education can gauge how much support for this proposed program exists, and to answer any questions you might have.

We look forward to seeing and hearing from the community on this important topic.

Hi Barbara,

Thank you for your email.

At Cornwall Consolidated School we take security very seriously.

We followed Wolcott School experience with Ransomware very closely. Over the years we have implemented numerous multi-tier policies, strategies and technologies in order to protect ourselves against Internet attacks in general and against ransomware attacks specifically.

Below is a description of the main defense vectors implemented at Cornwall Consolidated School:

- <u>Firewall</u> CCS has a commercial-grade sophisticated firewall which drops malicious traffic from the internet going to internal devices.
- <u>Firewalla</u> Intrusion detection device which silently monitors all network and instantly notifies us of any malicious traffic or suspicious activity on the ccs network.
- <u>File Server Resource Manager</u> On our file server where data is saved by users we look for data that match file extensions known by ransomware and prevent the files from being written to the file server.
- <u>Qnap Ransomware tools</u> The NAS that we use at CCS has been been upgraded with specific ransomware security features to prevent ransomware attacks against our backup and storage devices.
- Squid Proxy server We blacklist known malicious sites in real time.
- Training we train users on phishing emails and best internet practices.
- Offsite backups to HHS. We have a standing agreement with Housatonic High School to safely
 create nightly offsite backups of our servers and user data at another, separate physical
 location. This solutions solves a number of financial issues (AWS, S3, Azure costs are eliminated)
 while improving our speed of recovery in case of attack drastically. This solutions is presently
 being tested onsite and will be operational in December of 2019.
- End-user Managed Avast Anti-Virus Solution is protecting our Servers and Windows computers.
- <u>GFI Languard</u> has been installed on our internal network to automate patch management and to identify potential vulnerabilities before they can be exploited.

Even with these current and formidable defenses in place we are completely aware of the fact that most Ransomware attacks come with zero-day exploits (not able to be recognized and captured by Anti-Virus or firewall rules). Even with all the defenses in places, offline and offsite nightly backups remain our best protection against ransomware. Ransomware attackers are smart, patient and exceptionally sophisticated as they continue to come up with new ways to deliver malicious payloads through multiple defenses.

Our best defense remains end-user education and constant vigilant monitoring of the network (NAGIOS).

We have planned a Ransomware educational presentation (see attached) that we are presently in the process of scheduling to deliver this presentation to CCS Staff and Faculty in order to train everyone on specific techniques to avoid ransomware.

CEN Schedule a Conference on Ransomware on November 19th, that we are already registered for.

I hope this answers some of your questions.

I am very pleased to see that this issue is getting attention it deserves. I will be very happy to come in person and present this information in further detail to the First Selectman, Gordon Ridgway and a committee of your choice.
