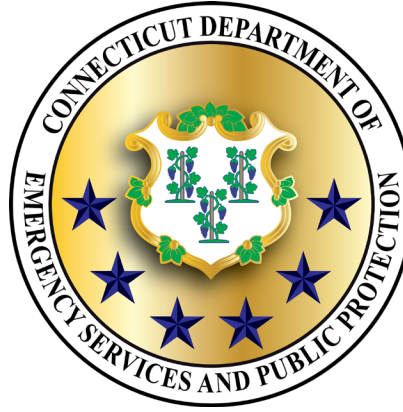

UPDATE FROM DESPP/DEMHS AT 12:30 PM MODERATELY STRONG WINDS EXPECTED TONIGHT

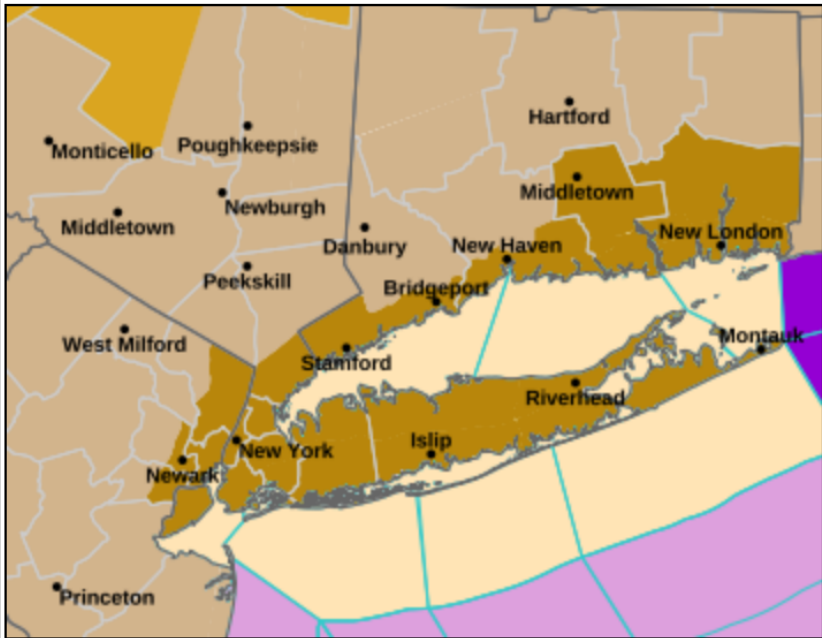

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
Wind Advisories have been issued for all of northern Connecticut and also for northern Fairfield and New Haven Counties starting between 7:00 - 10:00 PM this evening and continuing until 8:00 AM Thursday morning.









Additional Wind Advisories or perhaps a few High Wind Warnings will be issued for the coast and Middlesex and New London Counties later this afternoon.

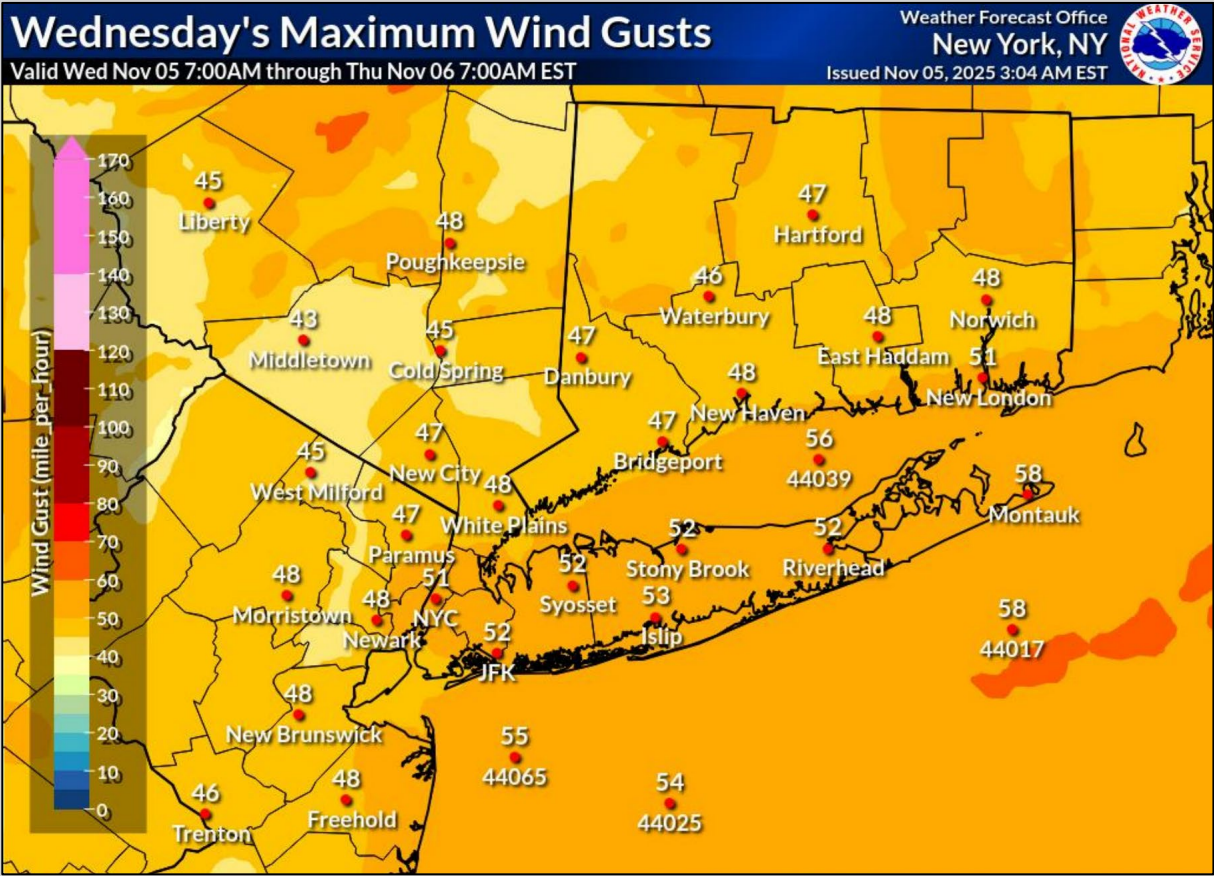

An intensifying low-pressure system will track north of our area this evening and push a strong cold front across the state.

Northwest winds behind the front are forecast to quickly move into the state this evening and continue overnight.

Towns can expect Northwest winds to be sustained at 20 – 30 MPH with gusts to 40 – 50 MPH at times overnight.

The strong winds are forecast to gradually subside during the day on Thursday.

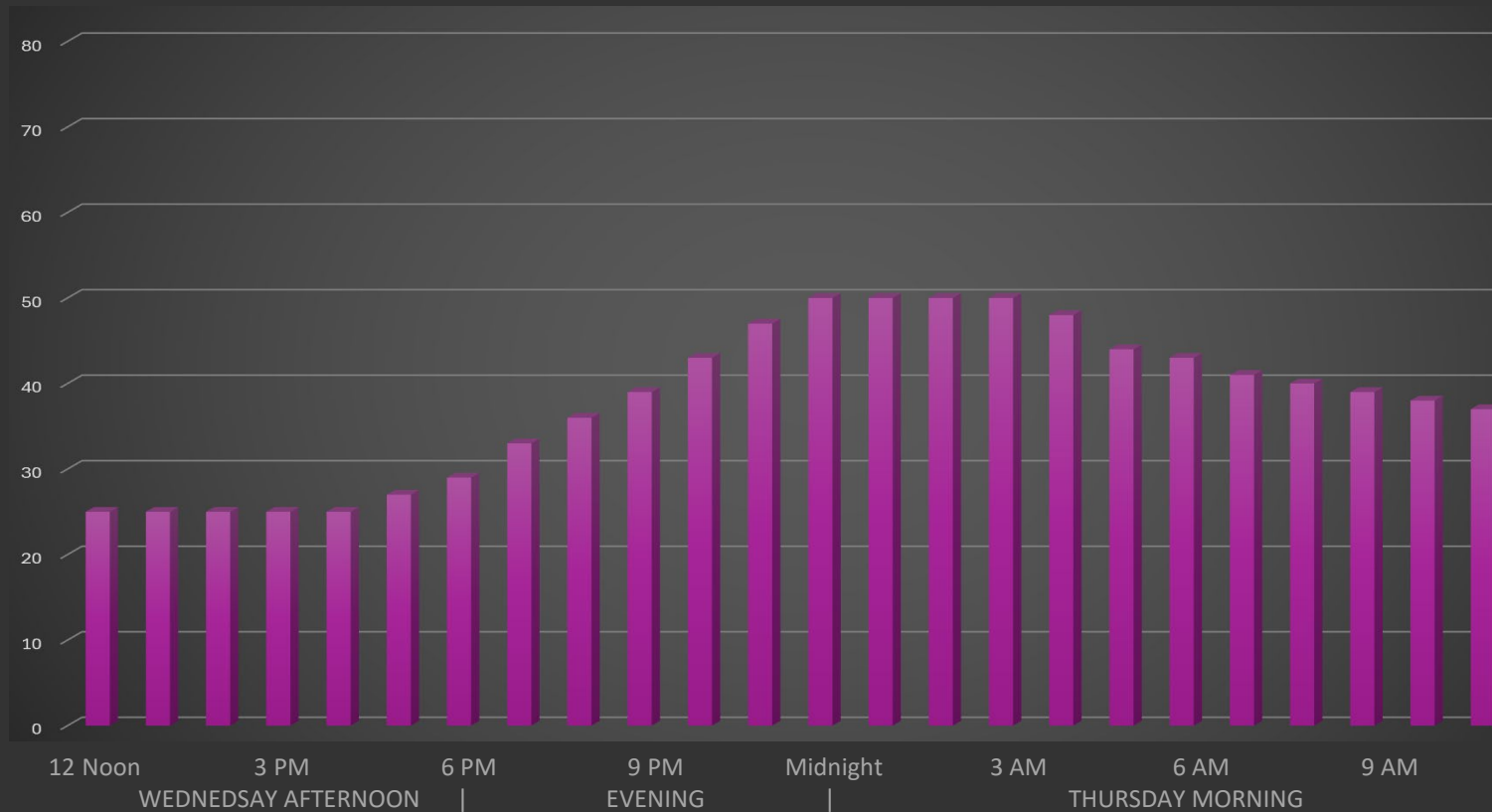




Threat Timing for Strong Winds...

IMPACT ON POWER

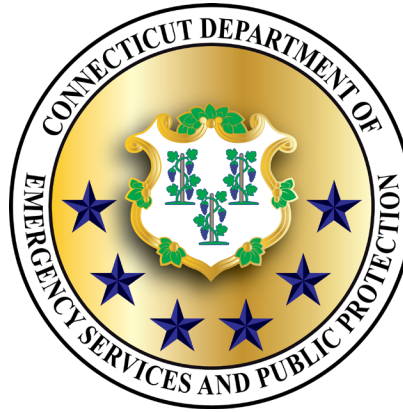


The impact of these moderately strong winds on power lines is expected to be in the upper end of the minor impact range. Towns should expect some scattered outages overnight.

Although not expected, towns should report any significant wind damage to their DEMHS Regional Office as time permits.
